President's Message

Leaner Budget Times Ahead

We will begin the next budget year (October 2012) with a tighter operating budget. It is not nearly as bad as the close of 2004 when we were forced to make draconian cuts in what we spent to right size and make solvent our operations. The 2013 fiscal year will commence with approximately \$100,000 less in contributions and matching funds from the PVA national organization. That reduction will be about 24% of our current operating budget. These are difficult times for all charities especially with a new "veterans charity" appearing every day. Our national organization is likewise looking at substantial reductions as it (we) look to wean away from reliance on the mail program which continues to be less cost-effective and subject to criticism from watchdog organizations. Gateway currently receives 37% of its total revenue from the national organization; that percentage will go down the next fiscal year. Our Chapter fortunately emphasizes other revenue sources like our very successful golf tournament and our rental income for leasing out about one half of our building. More than half of the PVA chapters have a 50% or more reliance on the national organization for their total chapter revenue. Fortunately, I do not foresee any reduction in Gateway programs. It's a credit to our Executive Director Susan Lyle and the Gateway board that we are in as good a financial position as we now have.

Indomitable Spirit of SCI Veterans

As I write this article, I have spent the vast majority of the last seven weeks at home in bed, rolling from side to side every four hours, trying to heal a 1/2 inch line on my backside. Of course each time it got better, I stayed up too long in the chair thinking it was healed, only to go back to bed for several more days. Any time I started to feel sorry for myself, I only had to think of the many SCI members on bed rest in the Jefferson Barracks Spinal Cord Injury Unit. Those men and women spend months in bed especially after flap surgery. Last Thursday I was at the unit and visiting with a fellow who had spent six months in bed and was up for one hour for the first time. He was overjoyed just to get outside and breathe fresh air.

Bob Kiger Passes

Since my last article our long-time member, Bob Kiger, passed away at the end of April. Several of our members attended the funeral in Dixon, Missouri, on May 2nd. Our driver took the Gateway bus and transported members to the funeral. I was in bed and upset I couldn't make the funeral. Bob Kiger was one of my favorite people and he was about the same injury level as me. For over the last year he had to endure breathing with a tracheotomy apparatus in his throat. Having been there, I know what a miserable existence that is. Nevertheless, Bob's spirits remained high and he was living at home after being rejected (he apparently required too much care) from staying in a Missouri Veterans Home and a short, uncaring stay in a private nursing home. His family made sacrifices and pulled together to take care of him at his mother's home for his remaining days. Bob now joins Matt Wilcox, Denis Canoy, Bob Bruns and many other Gateway members who have recently passed. I say "recently" only because I vividly recall these individuals as long time active Gateway members who epitomized Gateway's vision statement of "... living life to the fullest." Our prayers should go out to Kiger's family, as well as the families of all deceased members and we should be reminded how fragile is the life of our members with a spinal cord injury or disease.



Veterans Retraining Assistance Program (VRAP)

As part of the VOW to Hire Heroes Act of 2011, VRAP offers up to 12 months of training assistance to unemployed veterans, ages 35-60 (please visit http://benefits.va.gov/vow/education.htm to view all of the eligibility requirements). Participants must be enrolled in a VA-approved program of education offered by a community college or technical school. Also, the program must lead to an Associate Degree, Non-College Degree, or a Certificate, and it must train the veteran for a "high demand" occupation. VA Programs Exempt from Sequestration

In late April, the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) released an official statement announcing that VA programs (health care in particular) are exempt from sequestration (automatic, across-the-board budget cuts). A potential 2% cut to VA programs was set to occur in January 2013 before this clarification was made. PVA National President Bill Lawson, along with other Veterans Service Organizations, testified at a joint hearing of the House and Senate Committees on Veterans' Affairs in March about the destructive consequences sequestration would have on veterans. Gateway Chapter President Brown and I also spoke with many of our legislators about this issue during our March congressional visits. Finally, even though VA programs have been declared exempt from the cuts, there is legislation that would provide permanent clarification that VA programs are exempt from any future sequestration (H.R. 3895 and S. 2128).

Military Construction and Veterans Affairs Appropriations Act of 2013

The House passed H.R. 5854 on May 31, by a vote of 407-12. The bill does not quite meet the recommendations made in the *Independent Budget* (co-authored by PVA), but is a close match to the Obama Administration's budget request released in February. Earlier, on May 22, the Senate Appropriations Subcommittee on Military Construction and Veterans' Affairs approved its own version, S. 3215. It's unclear at the moment if work will be completed on the MilCon/VA appropriations bill before FY2013 begins this October.

Inclusive Home Design Act (IHDA)

One of our advocacy/legislative point papers presented at the March seminar, H.R. 5781 (IHDA) was officially introduced by Illinois Congresswoman Jan Schakowsky on May 16. IHDA requires "visitability" features (basic levels of architectural access for individuals with disabilities) in all newly constructed, federally assisted single-family housing. The bill has been referred to the House Subcommittee on Insurance, Housing and Community Opportunity.

Missouri General Assembly- The 2012 legislative session wrapped up on May 18, and HB 1731 was signed into law, which provides a dedicated funding source for the state's seven veterans homes. Governor Nixon visited one of those veterans homes in Mexico, MO on May 30 to attend a bill-signing ceremony. This legislation changes how revenue from the Missouri Gaming Commission is allocated, which results in over \$30 million annually for the Veterans' homes. HB 1731 received strong bi-partisan support in both chambers.

Illinois General Assembly – The 2012 legislative session concluded on May 31, 2012 (the legislature passed the Hiring Veterans Tax Credit, SB 3241, which provides up to a \$5,000 tax credit to employers who hire post-9/11 veterans).

I looked at her and asked, "What would I be doing?" Her reply was, "You would be skiing." I started to laugh at her and told her, "I never skied when I had two good legs, now I have one and you want me to ski?!" We laughed about that, but it turned out to be the best decision I ever made. So three years ago I decided to try skiing - this year I decided to try a new event which was curling. I remember watching curling on TV and thinking that does not look like that much fun. But I was wrong - it has turned into my new passion. Along with finding a new passion for curling I ended up on the cover of the daily Winter Sports Clinic paper *The Summit*. <u>Patrick Hokanson</u>- Navy Vet, 1st year attending...downhill skiing. "It was emotionally overwhelming – in a good way – I can't wait for next year." <u>David Johnson</u>- Army Vet, 2nd year attending...downhill skiing. "My coach asked me if I wanted to go to the top of the mountain and live dangerously. I told him, "Why not, I always live dangerously."

<u>Charlie Johns</u>- Army Vet, 11th year attending...cross country skiing. "Cross country skiing is the greatest sport up here. It gives you a great work out, along with a good feeling when you have skied cross country."

V. Smith- Air Force Vet, 3rd year attending...trip to Aspen. "Skiing is about conquering your fears. I am really afraid of heights. I conquered this fear by riding the gondola lift in Aspen and skiing at 12,000 feet on top of a mountainside. If anything, the phrase I would use is, "I CAN."

Then, I asked Kathy Ricker, "How has organizing/coaching the team changed your life?"

<u>Kathy Ricker</u>- Coach-Spinal Cord Injury Coordinator, 5th year attending. "I love the look of joy on the faces of the veterans when they discover they can do something they'd perhaps not considered before."

This year we had a new coach, Melissa Jacobson. I asked Melissa, "Was the

clinic anything like you imagined?"

Melissa Jacobson-Coach, 1st year attending. "The Winter Sports Clinic was more amazing than I could have imagined—to see so many disabled veterans in one place, supporting each other, trying and succeeding at sports they never thought possible and being inspired to go home and do even MORE—truly inspirational for everyone involved."





VA PROSTHETIC CHANGES IN PURCHASING

Our Veterans Integrated Service Network is known as VISN 15. It covers the VA hospitals in Missouri (Columbia, Kansas City, St. Louis and Poplar Bluff), as well as Kansas (Leavenworth, Topeka and Wichita) and Marion, IL.

VISN 15 has a Network Contract Manager. She supervises the nine team members in this department that are specifically designated to this team. According to VISN 15 Director of Prosthetics they are anticipating approximately 4,000 orders a year in which they will process two to four orders a day. The team is made up of two Prosthetic Agents taken from the Kansas City VAMC and seven contractors. They will be responsible for ordering all prosthetic items over \$3,000. Items included are customized wheelchairs, artificial limbs, implants, stair glides, patio lifts, ramps and HISA grants.

Their job will be to approve line items that the different VA Hospitals will be submitting. An example of how it works: A veteran requires a power wheelchair. His primary care provider puts in a consult that explains what the item is that is needed with medical justification. The veteran is then referred to the Wheelchair Committee where he will be measured. This committee will determine what his needs are and any specialty features he may require (reclining, seat system, leg rest, controls, etc). The order will go into a Purchasing Agent in the Prosthetics Dept. They will put together a "purchasing package."

If it is determined to be over \$3,000 it will be sent to this new team. They may approve it (as is) and send approval for the VA Hospital Prosthetics Department to order the item; or send out three (3) bids across the country to get the best possible rate. If there isn't appropriate justification or something wasn't included in the package, it could be sent back to Prosthetics for further justification.

According to the VISN Director this should only delay the ordering process by seven working days if everything goes according to plan. We, however, anticipate a longer delay. All PVA service officers will be keeping a spreadsheet of these items as we are informed of them. It is vitally important that if you are in need of these items that after your doctor puts in a consult that you contact your local PVA Service Officers to alert them to put your name on their spreadsheet. We can only monitor the issues since we have been informed that there is no contacting the Logistics Department. Your local VA Prosthetics Department is the only way to check on these items.

I would also like you to know that the Kansas City VAMC is presently down three vital positions in the Prosthetics Dept. They are presently hiring in this area but it is causing some delays of service. The process that an individual goes through to be hired is usually extensive. We can only hope they will be expedient in filling these positions.

Deer Blinds

Each year, on the weekend before the Thanksgiving holiday, disabled hunters get the opportunity to put some meat in the freezer or even bag a trophy.



The deer blinds need a path, a small ramp, and a little maintenance.

The deer herd at Smithville Lake has been increasing in recent years. Vehicle accidents and some crop damage on

adjoining land is already a problem at the lake and throughout the state. Disease and starvation can also ravage a deer herd if its population is not kept in check. Officials hope that besides providing recreation for hunters with disabilities, the hunt will help control the deer population.

In 1990, 18 blinds were open and hunters shot nine deer. In 2011, 55 blinds were open and 93 deer were killed. This year there are plans for four new blinds to be placed. Most of the hunting is on land managed by the Corps of Engineers. Some

undeveloped areas of parks leased by Clay County are also used. This program provides a

weekend in the outdoors that 59 disabled hunters stand in line (no pun intended) for the opportunity to participate. There is always a waiting list to get a blind.

Over the last 24 years this program has not only benefited the disabled hunter and the parks and recreation department, but the benefit to the animal population cannot be measured. The years of use of the blinds and exposure to the elements has worn them out. Many need to be repaired or replaced. Thanks to the Gateway Chapter Paralyzed Veterans of America, the blinds used in the hunt are going to be repaired. Necessary fixes such as ramps, leveling of the blinds and new floors will be completed because of this generous donation by the Chapter. Throughout the summer and fall, updates and photos will be sent to the *Gazette* so that you can see the progress from this gift.

Thanks should also go to Derek Dorsey, park manager at Smithville Lake State Park. Without his dedication and guidance, we could not do this hunt.
