

"I remember meeting Dr. Huskey when I came on the board in 2005, he was the Vice President. Whenever he spoke it was to suggest improvements for our membership. He never stopped caring for membership even after he nominated me for Vice President, he continued to help. Bob was an advocate, often using himself as a guinea pig when traveling, he suffered many mishaps at the hands of the airlines. He did love to travel, he and Bea traveled all over the world. VA Staff would often ask him to share his travel experiences with other spinal-cord injury Veterans to promote interest in outside activity. He was my mentor. I sure do miss him.

My husband, Victor, remembers going to the Wheelchair Games in Anchorage, Alaska with Bob and Bea Huskey. We had a wonderful week and at the airport for our return trip, there was no plane for our 3:20 pm, scheduled flight number. Every two hours the announcement was made that our plane should arrive within the next two hours. Bob was very concerned for the veterans, they needed their medicines, pressure release, and needed to stay hydrated... The only available seating was plastic molded seats bolted to a long bench, and no place to transfer onto that would work for our SCI teammates Bob's only concern was for His SCI veterans to be taken care of. Bob was stuck in his power chair all night, out of medicine and uncomfortable, until we got a plane the next day at 9 am. I will never forget his compassion for others!" – Rose Ganz

"Bob Huskey has been a friend to me from day one. He was an outstanding mentor and provided a great deal of knowledge to the board and me over the years he was a member of the Gateway Chapter. He was not only a great supporter of PVA, but he was also interested in YOU. He was never one to brag, but was there to listen and give guidance to help you out. "I first met Bob almost 15 years ago and he had an immediate impact on the direction of my life. I didn't expect it, but that's what Bob did with almost everyone that he came into contact with. He urged them to challenge their view of things, expand their minds and become better versions of themselves in the process.

Over the years, I learned that he and Bea had traveled to every corner of the States and had visited countries that I would have thought impossible for him to navigate using a wheelchair. But with characteristic determination, he experienced life as most of us can only hope to do.

Bob was thoughtful, kind, determined and believed in the power of community. But Bob also had a mischievous side. He loved having feeders around his deck so that he could watch the many types of birds that would visit. I'm not saying that he disliked squirrels, but I know for a fact that he did not like the squirrels raiding his bird feeders.

Having said that, one of my favorite memories with Bob included a new "special" type of bird feeder that he had installed on his deck. It was a

morning in November and he invited me to look at his new feeder. I thought, "okay" but what I didn't know was that it had a battery operated shield designed to discourage squirrels. As we sat in his living room looking out onto the deck, a squirrel approached the feeder on the deck's handrail. As the squirrel got closer to the feeder Bob said "keep watching." The squirrel tried to access the feeder but received a small zap from the battery operated shield and jumped about 10 feet off of that feeder. Bob started to chuckle and reminded me never to forget to stand up for what you believe. In that case, it was feeding his birds.

That moment is how I will remember Bob for the rest of my life. I'm going to miss him." - Chris Blanchard



We are riding in a new, 2023 Honda Pilot, learning the many automated features on this model. Learning the many settings to the cruise control; following distance, economy setting, driver attention level. It is a challenge to keep up with all this technology.

As we go through Kansas City we talk about the Royals games we've attended, and PVA members that attended with us. The Boccia Nationals, and the Mid-America Games; Boccia Regionals we've participated in there. As we pass the oil rigs pumping, Victor reminisces about his time at Fort Riley, Kansas. Victor's son, Benjamin was born there at St Marie's Hospital, in Manhattan, KS, where we owned a house. As we go by the towns, we remember staying in so many of these cities, on our way to Recreational Rehabilitation Clinics. And then there are the memories of convoying out with other St Louis Team members. Like Chasing Joel in his big green, Ford van, 427 engine, four wheel drive, leaving Mike and Jamie and us in the dust. Laughing at the Team member that got popped by the radar gun, laughing at how the police were disgusted that we were disabled veterans going to an official veteran function. Almost always getting away with just a warning!

Finding a hotel, and all of us staying in the same place. Team building, supporting one another and the safety net in case of breakdown. And as we just can't take another painful mile, is when the decision is made to find a hotel for the night. Moaning and groaning, we all drag our butts into the hotel for the night.

As we approach Denver on Monday, the second day on the road, we think of the Wheelchair Games that we attended in Denver. Coors Field to watch a Rockies baseball game, and Bronco Stadium where LaRoy won the Motor Rally by answering all the local trivia questions correctly. Charley Wright's first National Veterans Wheelchair Games, and going out on the prairie to kayak on a huge lake. Kayaking was an exhibition sport

that year.



We are climbing mountains as we drive past Denver.

Majestic, snow capped mountain tops, and you can see forever up there. We see the old towns, wooden build-

ings straight out of a cowboy movie. The old relics of tractors and snowplows, and the remains of mineshafts along the highways edge.

Throughout this road trip, we are day dreaming of what it would be like to get an abandoned ranch, and what animals or hobbies we would establish there. The privacy, unique environment at each location, how we would tough it out and make our stake in our own remote piece of America.

After we pass Vail and descend down a valley between mountains, it seems like hours later, we come to Glenwood Springs. This is where we get off highway 70 and start to climb up a mountain pass, on highway 82, towards Aspen for about an hour. Just before we get to Aspen airport, we turn right on Brush Creek Road and continue to climb for another twenty minutes into Snowmass Village. We made it, so many familiar faces

and relief that we can get out of the car for the next week!

We got an email from Matt, just before we left, saying parking would be difficult to find, first come first serve, maybe \$ 50 dollars a day to park. I drop Rose

Then a hotel guy tells us: "If you give me your keys, valet parking is free if you are staying here, and I will go park your car." My eyes are wide and I am not convinced that I didn't just get sucker punched by another scheme to rip me off. But we are now able to enter our room and breathe, stretch, and shower. We did get valet parking for free, all week!

What a comfort when Matt L. text that he was at the Aspen Airport, and would see us in about an hour. Knowing your coach is there, is such a boost to your confidence.

We wore a coat out the door every morning, then theweather would warm up quickly. The sun is very intense up at 7,000 feet. All of the St Louis participants were either on Team Lodge Pole (can walk) or Team Bear Bottom (in a chair). Wednesday Rose went handcycling in the town of Basalt. Thursday Rose went downhill skiing on a sit down bi-ski. Then we went with Ann and Ron to get ice cream, there in Snowmass Village, where we were staying the week. Friday Rose went cross-country skiing and snowshoeing. Saturday Rose skied the downhill again, but it was 18 degrees, so that required more layers of padding (ski pants and a heavier coat). Sunday Rose skied the downhill race in 26 seconds, her personal best. Then we joined our team for lunch and a few desserts. Then we attended the closing ceremonies and had dinner with the whole St Louis Team. Monday morning we gave Coach Matt a hug goodbye, and began our drive through those majestic mountains once again. And it is literally all down hill from there to St Louis. It was a smooth ride home, after a glorious week of meeting new St Louis Team members and catching up with veterans we have known for years.
