ARE YOU A ST. LOUIS CITY RESIDENT WITH SPECIAL NEEDS?

An exciting new program has been established, called the "Special Needs Registry." It is the first of its kind in the state and one of the few in the country that identifies those who would need help in an emergency and exactly what kind of assistance is needed. For example, do you have medication that needs refrigeration or use oxygen or need assistance to leave your house in times of public emergencies? This program will serve to identify you through a restricted database that will only be available to emergency responders, the City's Human Services Department, and public health agencies. Consideration is being given to expanding the program statewide if funds can be made available.

I appreciate your concern and willingness to serve. As this calendar year closes, I look back and smile at what our Gateway




Chapter has accomplished. We have finished our third straight fiscal year with revenues exceeding expenses, and are again able to put money in the bank. We have also been very careful in not exceeding the FDIC insurance limits with our deposits in separate accounts. We continue to search to purchase a building at a convenient location for our membership that also has ready access to Jefferson Barracks. Most importantly, in my opinion, our Chapter this year was able to stop the VA train that left incredibly without notice to us, that was the St. Louis VA plans to close the SCI unit at Jefferson Barracks and relocate it to new construction at the John Cochran VA Hospital. The last accomplishment I will mention that makes me smile, was our expanded free transportation program this year. For the first time to my knowledge, our Chapter started providing free rides to some of our members who reside in nursing homes. Having lived in nursing homes the first two years after my injury, I can't stress how important this is to our members to be able to get them out in the community.

With our successful financial year, our Board also voted to donate a total of \$10,000 to the new Fisher House being built at Jefferson Barracks. The Fisher House Foundation provides one-half funding, the other half to be raised locally, for temporary lodging for family members of hospitalized veterans. Our Board feels strongly this is especially needed for the families of SCI/D veterans hospitalized at the SCI unit in Building 52. Groundbreaking is November 11, 2008 with plans for opening one year later.

Kansas City Area November 14 Membership Forum







Sports or a Night Out

Gateway Chapter PVA—Participation Points

- A. Points may be used to qualify for Sports & Recreation events funding.
- B. Points may also now be used to qualify for Membership Entertainment purposes. (i.e. dinners, movies, etc.—in the form of gift cards or tickets issued to the member) Membership Entertainment participation points will be calculated at \$1.00 per point earned, up to \$75 annually per member. Participation points are used once per year for either Entertainment or Sporting events; may not be combined with Sports Points earned.
- C. If multiple events are attended during the year, qualifying points will be subtracted after the event is attended.

National Director's Report

In August I attended the 62nd PVA Annual Convention in Portland, Oregon. Traveling by airplanes the last year have put me in bed with pressure sores for a total of three months during the year, so I chose to travel by car with my attendant. It was about 2000 miles one way, but the scenery in Wyoming and upstate Washington was spectacular. Most importantly, I survived the trip with my backside in tact.

On the national level we continue to face a declining economy and search for new revenue sources. Our history of relying on our mail program for revenue is becoming more problematic and challenging. We are currently looking for our involvement with Richard Petty Enterprises, and the NASCAR market, to be a major new source of corporate sponsors and revenue. The convention delegates voted to return basically the same slate of officers. Randy Pleva was elected as President and Gene Crayton as Senior Vice President; Craig Enenbach will return as Treasurer. There was one change of liaison Vice Presidents, with Al Kovac from the San Diego Chapter, coming on board. Bill Lawson will become Gateway's liaison.

The most important discussion at the convention concerned new VA plans for the delivery of healthcare in VISN 19, specifically the Fitzsimmons VA Hospital in Denver. After years of planning to build a new hospital and provide a 30-bed SCI unit in the hospital, the VA Secretary proposed a new, and in my opinion devastating, plan to outsource and privatize SCI care into a community-based system. Credit goes to our national PVA leaders for quickly organizing other veterans' service organizations, mobilizing Colorado legislators, and forcefully going on record in opposition to providing SCI care at various community-based clinics. The VA Secretary concept on paper extols the virtues of providing care away from urban centers with dwindling population, and taking advantage of telemedicine. The concept also admits the cost savings of not building large VA hospitals. PVA quickly and correctly, recognized this plan could be the beginning of dismantling how the VA delivers health care to veterans, and health care to veterans specialty care, SCI care, in particular. The plan proposed a new five-bed (previously 30) unit for SCI rehabilitation and care within the new scaled down VA Hospital, and proposed the services be performed in different community-based clinics. The proposal dismisses the benefits of having SCI veterans in rehabilitation in one SCI Center with a stable team of SCI physicians, nurses, and therapists. Also lost in the plan is the benefit of having the veterans going to rehabilitation with other veterans with similar injuries and spinal cord disease. In my opinion, the benefit of having these men and women socializing and adapting together in an environment of shared experiences outweighs any cost savings of dividing the care among community-based clinics. These proposed VA changes for VISN 19 are now on hold, no doubt awaiting the outcome of the presidential election in November. Our PVA organization will work hard to convince the new administration such plans are not in the best interest of our membership.

News for Veterans with ALS

Well, I just got back from Salt Lake City, Utah, attending the Veterans Benefit Department annual Continuing Education Program (CEP) training seminar. One of the hot topic items was the recent decision by Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) Secretary James B. Peake, to allow service-connection of Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis (ALS) for veterans who served honorably in the armed forces. The time in



service requirements are listed in the law under 38 U.S.C. 1112(a) and federal regulations 38 CFR 3.307(a)(1), states the presumptions of service incurrence for various conditions, such as chronic diseases and tropical diseases, applies generally to eligible veterans with at least 90 days of active, continuous service. This is great news for our veteran members and non-members who may now be eligible for membership.

ALS, also known by its more familiar name, Lou Gehrig's disease, was first identified as a disease in 1869. Although much more is known about the disease today, we still do not know what causes the disease or how it can be prevented, effectively treated, or cured. The VA has established in its interim final rule (as this is being referred to) that a new 38 CFR 3.318 to provide that the development of ALS at any time after discharge or release from active military, naval, or air service is sufficient to establish service connection for that disease. Paragraph (b) of new 38 CFR 3.318 provides that this presumption of service connection for ALS does not apply if there is affirmative evidence that ALS was not incurred during or aggravated by such service or affirmative evidence that ALS was caused by the veteran's own willful misconduct. The VA understands the unlikelihood of someone contracting ALS due to willful misconduct, but that is part of the criteria in establishing the service connection.

ALS is a progressive, neurodegenerative disease that attacks nerve cells and pathways in the brain and spinal cord. Motor neurons reach from the brain to the spinal cord and from the spinal cord to muscles throughout the body. It is through these neurons that we are able to control all muscle movement, whether it be moving our arms and legs, or simply breathing or opening and closing our eyelids. Eventually, these motor neurons cease to function and die. As a result, one's ability to initiate and control muscle movement is lost and ultimately results in total paralysis. The average life expectancy for a person with ALS is two to five years from the time of diagnosis. This is why this new decision is so important. We need to identify any and all veterans who have been diagnosed with ALS, or who may have died as a result of ALS, so that we can ensure that they and/or their families can be properly compensated for service connection of this disease. This includes surviving spouse's filing for Dependent's Indemnity Compensation (DIC) benefits.
