Is it actually to help other members by raising money or perhaps doing peer mentoring, or is it "merely" to earn participation points for self-interest? Now being a seasoned veteran, some would say curmudgeon, when I hear people speak or receive their email, I instinctively and probably unfairly think "giver" or "taker."

ANNUAL JACK BUCK/ GPVA GOLF TOURNAMENT FUNDRAISER - OCTOBER 8

Tuesday, October 8, 2019, is our 24th charity golf tournament. This event is

our biggest fundraiser of the year and we usually net after expenses \$70,000-\$100,000. The tournament again this year will be held in far West St. Louis County, at the Landings at Spirit Golf Course. POSSIBLE NEW HOUSE GIVEAWAY

Good thing this is not the April issue of our newsletter. After reading the above heading you might say: "Yeah, right." Our Executive Director and I have been contacted by a charity fundraising group that said they would like to build a house for "a paralyzed veteran." I told him we could certainly find a good candidate. I don't have any more details at this time, but if this sounds interesting to you, you need to do two things: 1) make sure the Chapter has your name and current email because we will probably send out a notice by email and 2) if you don't have an email address or want to be sure, call the office in late September and we should know the status of this program/opportunity.

GATEWAY IS STILL LOOKING FOR A FEW GOOD WOMEN/ MEN

PVA has just opened their new Chapter Hospital Liaison (CHL) program whereby Gateway members will visit both the SCI Hub Jefferson Barracks and John Cochran six bed acute care unit, and spokes to include the Kansas City, Columbia, Poplar Bluff, Marion Illinois, and Kansas spokes in Leavenworth, Topeka, and Wichita. We still need volunteers for the Columbia, Marion, Poplar Bluff and Wichita participation spokes. Your only requirement is to visit the spoke at least once every three months and fill out and submit a preprinted report detailing how many people you saw, any issues you heard from patients or staff, and generally tell us how our members/people are being treated. You will receive participation points for the position plus time that you spend talking with SCI patients. If you travel more than 50 miles one way, you will be reimbursed at the rate of \$0.40 per mile. Please call the office if you are interested and I will talk to you. I can also send you a copy of the new CHL manual and forms for reporting.

\$110,000 IN VEHICLE GRANTS AWARDED

At our August Board of Directors meeting, the Board voted to award two \$35,000 grants and four \$10,000 grants to purchase or trade in for an accessible vehicle. No other PVA Chapter has such a program.

Blue Water Claims Welcomes

a New Wave of Claims

Claims for service connection due to Agent Orange exposure require two things. First, a veteran must be diagnosed with one of the fourteen illnesses listed in 38 CFR 3.309 (e) – (AL Amyloidosis, Chronic B-cell Leukemias, Chloracne, Diabetes Mellitus Type 2, Hodgkin's Disease, Ischemic Heart Disease, Multiple Myeloma, Non-Hodgkin's Lymphoma, Parkinson's Disease, Peripheral Neuropathy, Early-Onset, Porphyria Cutanea Tarda, Prostate Cancer, Respiratory Cancers, and Soft Tissue Sarcomas).

Secondly, veterans must meet certain geographic service requirements. Up until this year, veterans were required to prove they set foot in Vietnam or somewhere near the Korean Demilitarized Zone. Simply flying over Vietnam does not meet the service requirement.

However, the Blue Water Navy Vietnam Veterans Act of 2019 has expanded the area of possible exposure. The new law was signed on 6/25/2019, and takes effect on 1/1/2020. Per Public Law 116-23, veterans who served aboard a vessel on the inland waterways, or on a vessel operating not more than 12 nautical miles seaward from the demarcation line of the waters of Vietnam and Cambodia may be eligible for compensation benefits.

Eligible Navy veterans must provide evidence to support that they served on a ship that was in the specified territory waters. The needed information may be found by searching Navy Deck Logs and/or Carrier Reports. The National Archives has digitized a sizable number of deck logs for Navy ships. The digitized deck logs are available on this site: https://www.archives.gov/research/military/logbooks/navy-online. The list of ships are presented in chronological order. Each ship can be selected in order to review more in depth historical information.

The Blue Water Navy Association has also prepared a series of reports presenting information on when Aircraft Carriers entered the territorial seas off Vietnam within the required 12 nautical miles of the baseline.

For any veterans that had their claim for an Agent Orange issue previously denied can file a new claim based on the recent change in the law. If the claim gets approved, some veterans may get a retropayment back to the date when the original claim was submitted. Since the law doesn't go into effect until 1/1/2020, any Blue Water claims submitted before that date will be held by the VA. Contact your local NSO for any questions or to file a claim.

3rd Annual PVA Boccia Nationals

The PVA Boccia Nationals will be on October 23, 2019 to October 26, 2019, and is open to veterans and civilians with spinal cord injuries, amputations, poly-trauma, multiple sclerosis, or other neurological conditions. Veterans must also be eligible to receive care at a VA medical facility. No previous victories or tournament championships are required. Play is required in a wheelchair. Registration is limited to 50 athletes, and registration forms are due by September 28, 2019 with a \$50 registration fee. FREE Yoga and Tai Chi for SCI (Drop In Classes)

YOGA by Katherine McDonald - Wednesdays at 1pm to 1:45pm in the Jefferson Barracks Building 52 Dining Room. This class provides veterans an introduction to accessible yoga using a wheelchair or chair and promotes well-being in a small social group setting. Each group session proceeds through a seated breath awareness meditation practice, breath practice, a mindful movement practice, and a resting practice. A technique or theme of practice is emphasized each week, building upon elements that were introduced in previous weeks. Wear comfortable clothing for bending and stretching. No equipment required!

TAI CHI by Amber Lee - Thursdays at 3pm to 3:30pm in the Jefferson Barracks Building 52 North Dayroom. This class welcomes everyone to adaptive Tai Chi, which encourages soft movements and breathing exercises. Instructors will work with participants in developing their technique of the Seven Postures according to their physical capability. Promotion of visualization, relaxation and patience with one's self are key elements in class.

My friend and Gateway's friend and long time Gateway Treasurer, *Dennis Durrwachter*, passed away on July 1, 2019 from numerous respiratory issues. Dennis was only 66 and after having worked full time at Boeing as a



mechanical engineer for 39 years, was about to retire. He served on our Board of Directors for ten years and was Treasurer six years. I distinctly remember recruiting Dennis when I met him at the Rehab Institute of St. Louis. He was on a stationary bike and when I discovered he was not a PVA member I quickly got him to join up and become involved. We changed our meeting times, to alternate between days and early evenings, specifically to accommodate members like Dennis who work full time. He was in the Air Force for four years (1971-1975). Dennis was injured in 1999 in a small plane accident and continued to work full time, be active with PVA, his family, and his church. He was an avid hand-cyclist and as he told me "lost many pounds" cycling around Creve Coeur Lake. Dennis was survived by his wife, Brenda Durrwachter, daughter - Monica Combest, son -Joel Durrwachter, and two grandchildren. I distinctly remember going to his daughter Monica's wedding, where Dennis rose from his chair and then with arm braces on, walked his daughter down the aisle. There wasn't a dry eye in the chapel. Farewell our friend.

Thanks to all for the positive response to my first article in the last newsletter. Now, on to new items.

SCI parking permits in the Building 52 parking lot: we have ordered hang tags for eligible SCI veteran's use, which should arrive in September. Once they arrive, an email will be sent out via Gateway PVA, with instructions on how to obtain one. Until then, it is not necessary to fill out any forms. Continue to park in the current spaces as if they were disabled parking until we receive the hang tags. Thanks for your patience with this process.

Bowel and Bladder program: By now, all those who participate in the program should have received by mail, or through the Gateway PVA email, instructions on how to obtain an NPI number. This has to be done by September 30th in order to continue to receive payment. We have not received the Veteran's Care Agreement yet, which also needs to be signed and returned by 9/30, but will be providing those as soon as available.

Also, many have contacted the SCI Social Workers about delays in payment from the bowel and bladder **SEP/OCT 2019**

program. We have no control or day to day involvement with the payment process, and know you are frustrated. We have been advised to ask you to send your time sheets by US mail, or fax 2-3 times to ensure receipt. I know faxing can sometimes be difficult, and this has been communicated to the finance office. Brenda Eschenfelder is no longer able to take phone calls from veterans or caregivers, so all inquiries have to go to the Austin phone number or the customer care phone number 314-894-6603.

New Neurology Social Worker: For those of you who are seen in the ALS and MS clinic, or in neurology clinic in general, a full time social worker has recently started, Ebonee Lyle. She has been a social worker at the VA for 2.5 years in mental health. She will be taking my role in the ALS clinic, and I feel confident in leaving you in excellent hands. She will also be developing new programs in neurology, so please welcome her to the service. She is still getting settled, so to reach her call neurology clinic at 57914 and leave a message.
